Norton-on-Tees Anglo-Saxons travel to York




We have recently transferred over 250 human skeletons to the University of York as part of a post-graduate research programme.

The village of [Norton](#) has produced an unusual quantity of human burials from the 6th to 9th centuries AD. We hope that new scientific techniques will be able to tell us more about the ethnicity, diet and health of this important skeletal population.

Hartlepool Town Wall

Hartlepool Borough Council are currently upgrading the sea defences along the base of Hartlepool's medieval town wall. As part of this work we have been commissioned to carry out archaeological monitoring throughout the project in order that any features revealed can be recorded. We know that the wall was formerly punctuated by a number of towers and this is a unique opportunity to examine a long stretch of the monument.
